About Edmonton's Food Bank



The Edmonton Gleaners Association, more commonly known as Edmonton's Food Bank, was incorporated in 1981 and was the first food bank in Canada. Edmonton's Food Bank primarily operates as a central warehouse redistributing food to over 300 agencies, shelters, churches, schools, and food depots throughout the city to support their programs. Thanks to this consolidated effort, we ensure that food donations go directly to those who need it the most while reducing duplication of community efforts. In conjunction with our partner program support, we directly provide food hampers to tens of thousands of individuals and families monthly.

Message from Michael Capus



If 2021 was about learning how to adapt to the rapidly changing economic and affordability challenges in our community, then 2022 has certainly challenged what we thought we knew.

This past year has been tough on Edmonton's Food Bank and the people we serve. We hit a milestone, with 35,000+ community members requiring hampers in a single month. It was almost double what we were serving only three years ago. The demand was so high that we had difficulty keeping our shelves stocked and had to make some difficult operational choices to stretch our supplies to meet this growing demand.

Thankfully, we were once again able to rely on the generous support of our donors, volunteers, and partners who helped us raise more than 6 million kilograms of food and 10 million dollars. Without this support we would not have been able to afford the roughly \$280,000 a month that we are spending just on food, in addition to relying on our gleaning efforts for our hampers and other food programs.

I'm appreciative of the pride and commiment this organization and its people have for their work. Everyone I interact with through Edmonton's Food Bank is drawn to our mission: finding solutions to end hunger. It's our common thread and we continue to make strides aligned with this.

We recognize that food hampers are not a long term response and there are more ways we can help address those most in need. This past year, we expanded our Beyond Food program to help our clients and others have easier and non-stigmatizing access to employment supports.

We recognize and understand that Edmonton's Food Bank has a role to play in championing diversity. We're committed to leading with equity, inclusion, and diversity in all that we do. This past year we invested in equity, inclusion, and diversity training for our staff to support our clients and volunteers and we're continuing to build on strong partnerships with various community groups.

Finally, this past year, we purchased a new warehouse. Championed by the generosity of our donor community, this helps us further expand our services to meet the ever-growing demand. As an organization that requires physical space, this further reinforces our investment to support people in our community. This investment is part of our long-term strategy as the facility's mortgage is less than the cost of our rental warehouse. To learn more, feel free to reach out to the management team.





Where We Serve



OUR NEWEST ADDITION

Edmonton's Food Bank has grown considerably since its inception in 1981 and is still growing today.

In fall of 2022, we acquired the building between our main warehouse and The Annex to help us better accommodate our clients and ever-growing services. This building will primarily be used to store more nonperishable food and as a depot location, along with a pantry for clients.

Prior to acquiring the building we were renting storage space down the street to be able to store food, and now will have easier access with the addition of our third building.

Special thanks to the Muttart Foundation for providing us a mortgage.



THE ANNEX

Our second warehouse, called The Annex, houses three departments:

- Client Services (Call Centre)
- Resource Development
- Beyond Food Program



MAIN WAREHOUSE

Our main warehouse is the heart of food distribution and includes sorting, repackaging, hamper-making, and our agency sharing system. This warehouse also has walk-in coolers and freezers.

Our Programs & Services

HAMPERS

A food hamper is a box of food, consisting of fresh and non-perishable food items. Hampers are assembled based on the size of the household and any dietary requirements. Upon request, additional items may be added such as pet food, school snack items, and toiletries. We rely on donated food.

As a charity, Edmonton's Food Bank cannot provide all the nutritional and food needs for all people at all times. We encourage people to make purchasing food a priority when they receive their paycheques, salary, or government financial support. Beyond hampers, we refer people to other helping organizations to help with food planning or budgeting.





FOOD DEPOTS

We want people to a get their food in their neighbourhood close to home. To do this, we collaborate with 66 community food depots. Volunteers at these sites are instrumental for food access around Edmonton.



MOBILE FOOD DEPOTS

Where there are limited physical hamper distribution opportunities (i.e. no physical building to work from), hampers are delivered to specific communities using our Mobile Hamper Program.



EMERGENCY BAGS

These bags of food are for specific service providers for distribution to individuals in crisis. The bags are prepared with non-perishable items, some key staples, along with information to access other food. We work with the Edmonton Police Service to give to high-risk individuals and families, as well as groups like Scona Seniors for isolated and vulnerable seniors.

Our Programs & Services



AGENCY MEAL & SNACK PROGRAMS

Our work cannot be done in isolation. We work collaboratively with 320 community partners and agencies to distribute about 450,000 meals and snacks per month. Food access for our partner agencies depends on the program requirements and the focus of their mission, and is provided free of charge.

S.N.A.C.K. PROGRAM

(SUPPORTING NUTRITION FOR ALL CLASSES AND KIDS)

We provide healthy snacks to children and we are currently working with 88 schools plus numerous child focused programs throughout Edmonton. In addition to donated snacks from the public, the Food Bank purchases key items to ensure availability and nutrition. These purchased snacks have no added sugar, low sodium, and include items like granola bars, unsweetened apple sauce, and more.




Thanks to the ATCO EPIC campaign, our S.N.A.C.K Program got a financial boost of \$46,726! Funds were raised through employee giving and initiatives planned like volunteering Days of Caring, 50/50, and even a WestJet raffle. We are grateful for the combined efforts of ATCO and their staff.



AFTER THE BELL

Thanks to Food Banks Canada and amazing donors, we shared 7,280 healthy food packs through various agencies directly to children. After the Bell reduces child hunger by providing a lifeline over the summer for many low-income families with children. These child friendly, nutritious packs contain nonperishable food along with a variety of fresh fruit and vegetables like carrots, apples, oranges, and snap peas depending on the weeks' fresh purchases.

Our Programs & Services

BEYOND FOOD

In a collaborative effort between community agencies, the Beyond Food Program provides wrap around support and services to those experiencing poverty and food insecurity. We help clients become more self-sufficient and improve their employability. These services include academic upgrading, computer literacy skills, first aid training, safety tickets, interview and resume preparation, and more.

Thanks go out to Edmonton Community Foundation, Accenture, and TD Canada Trust for their financial support of this program.

Ukrainian Support

When the war began in February, Ukrainians were immediately welcomed with open arms in Canada.

Edmonton's Food Bank instantly supported these individuals and families through our hamper programs. Thanks to key staff who speak Russian and Ukrainian, we were able to help them understand our services. We continue to help new Ukrainians as they make Edmonton their temporary home during this conflict.

In addition to the food support, we have been helping many Ukrainians in securing employment through our Beyond Food program. We have been working with The Learning Centre to assess individual Ukrainians on their English and to connect them to the right supports for them to succeed. Thanks to a couple of key volunteers, we were able to support people to get strong enough with the English language to participate in more structured classes. We also added volunteer connections in our warehouse to provide conversational language opportunities.

We are pleased to say that Edmonton's Food Bank has also hired a few Ukrainians ourselves in our warehouse and our call centre (client services). Working side-by-side, we are all serving our community, while also providing added help in translating for other new arrivals.

SECOND HELPING

In cooperation with conference centres and large banquet facilities, Second Helping gleans prepared yet not plated food from major kitchens. Donations are frozen, picked up, and made available to agency partners for use in their meal and snack programs. Donors adhere to Alberta Health Services protocols for food safety and packaging needs. Large donors to the program include the Edmonton Convention Centre and Rogers Place.

PLANT A ROW, GROW A ROW, SHARE A ROW

This program encourages people to earmark and donate their homegrown fruit and vegetables to Edmonton's Food Bank. Some businesses such as Greenland Garden Centre and the Royal Mayfair Golf Club took this philosophy a step further by donating free seedlings to be grown and donated to Edmonton's Food Bank. Other amazing donors like the Little Potato Company provided seed potatoes to many gardens.

Unfortunately, we are unable to list all our "greenthumb" donors who collectively raised more than 40,000 kilograms of fresh produce for our hamper programs and our agency partners. Some honourable mentions go out to David's Pandemic Farm 11,625 kilograms, the City of Edmonton Farm 10,850 kilograms, and for the first time, the Ukrainian Village planted their first garden for us and raised 252 kilograms of potatoes.

Food **Sources**

THE RETAIL FOOD PROGRAM

Edmonton's Food Bank started as a food gleaning organization in 1981. This salvaged food is the basis of our food sources and makes up two-thirds of the food we give out to people. We collect surplus food from retailers, distributors, and food industry partners across the city. This salvaged food may be considered surplus based on a number of factors including seasonal changes, overstock, or damaged exterior packaging.


All major food retailers are looking at ways to divert edible food from being wasted. We are proud to partner with our local grocery stores such as TGP, Overwaitea Foods, Sobeys, Loblaws, and Walmart to name a few. Additionally, our local producers and distributors like Canada Bread, Red Hat, Hello Fresh, Little Potato Company, and many, many more contribute surplus food to help our work.

Food Safety is one of our priorities. In response, our trucks are equipped with refrigerated units to ensure the cold chain remains intact. Our volunteers and staff take Safe Food Handling training and we track Food Recalls.

WALMART FIGHT HUNGER SPARK CHANGE

The fifth annual 'Fight Hunger. Spark Change' campaign raised \$173,240! These funds help purchase eggs, shelf-stable milk, fuel for our trucks and equipment to move food in our warehouse.

NORTH CENTRAL CO-OP



EDMONTON SIKH COMMUNITY

In recognition of the 553rd birthday of the founder of the Sikh religion, Guru Nanak Dev Ji, a donation of \$13,013 from our Edmonton Gurdwaras was made.



MAYFIELD DINNER THEATRE

The 22nd annual fundraiser, Toonies for Turkeys, collected donations from patrons to help us going into the new year. This year \$19,128 was raised.

FRASERWAY RV

We recieved a \$25,500 donation from long time supporters Fraserway RV. On top of this, they also collected non-perishable food donations at their RV Shows to feed those in need.

SNOW VALLEY SKI CLUB

We are lucky to have so many wonderful community partners, especially ones like the Snow Valley Ski Club. During the winter, they support us with their Food Bank Fridays (presented by Servus Credit Union) by donating \$2 from each lift ticket sold. In the summer, they collect non-perishable food items for their target golf in the summer. Snow Valley Ski Club and their dedicated patrons raised food and over \$18,434 – all the while providing fun for everyone.





CBC'S MAKE THE SEASON KIND

With the combined efforts of thousands of donors including private citizens and corporate giving, we raised a whopping \$1,096,015, surpassing their goal of a million dollars.

We were treated to stories of acts of kindness from across the city. Donors who had once needed support from the Food Bank shared the impact of receiving this help. The popular Grinch Walk also made a triumphant return.

We are unable to thank everyone who participated; however, a few awesome highlights include:

ENBRIDGE and their \$25,000 matching donations kicked off the 2022 campaign.

HOLYROOD SCHOOL'S 16th year raised \$10,822! This amazing tradition led by students and staff has surpassed \$350,000 of giving over the years.



EPCOR \$20,000 matching funds also triggered other gifts from donors.

PARK PAVING continued to find fun and unique ways year-round to raise funds to support this campaign. Because of this commitment, staff and management raised ~\$55,000!

SHERWOOD PARK TOYOTA & TOYOTA NORTHWEST EDMONTON gave a combined donation of \$250,000 which created an energetic on-air buzz for Blitz-Day. This was definitely a "mic drop" moment for everyone and pushed the overall initiative past its goal!



GOVERNMENT OF ALBERTA

With the exception of grants, federal funds in 2020, and the recent announcement in Alberta, Edmonton's Food Bank does not receive government funding for food and operations on an ongoing basis. We were pleased to hear of the announcement on November 23 of the \$20M to food banks and civil society. Because of this, we received \$280,000 that paid for a month of food purchases and have also been able to trigger the added \$50,000 matching commitment.

DAWN TO DUSK

Ramadan is a time for unity and spiritual reflection for members of the community. It is also a time of empathy and giving. The Edmonton Council of Muslim Communities helped collect and donated a generous \$42,000 in support of our work.



GIVE 30

Edmonton's Food Bank also participates in GIVE 30 where everyone, regardless of faith, is encouraged to give. Those fasting often tally up lunch or coffee money saved during the month to donate. It also inspires the broader community to give. Overall, the campaign collectively raised \$91,236 (including Dawn to Dusk donation).

FURNACE FAMILY

As part of our extended family, the Furnace Family raised 816 kilograms of food and \$2,200 - this ongoing support by their business and customers is greatly appreciated.

EDMONTON COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

Thanks to a BIPOC Grant of \$75,000, we were able to purchase more culturally appropriate foods for our wide range of clients including items like cooking oil, flour, and halal chicken.



PAYPAL GIVING FUND

For the first time through their charity, PayPal raised funds by providing the opportunity for users to donate when using their PayPal account. PayPal, their customers, including an Edmonton Elks donation of \$5,000, raised an impressive \$39,388!

THE SHAW FAMILY

The HOP Foundation, through a personal gift by the Shaw Family, has committed \$300,000 annually to Edmonton's Food Bank. A combined \$2.1M has helped pay for child-focused food to ensure continued positive impact for youth. Everything from shelf stable milk to peanut butter and eggs are purchased with this gift.



EDMONTON FOOD DRIVE

Thousands of volunteers from The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints once again organized a citywide food drive in September. An astonishing 107,378 kilograms of food was donated!

This is the single largest campaign donation in our history and re-stocked our bare shelves. This event could not happen without the support from trucking companies including Matco, Action, Grimshaw, Purolator, and Bison.

PUROLATOR TACKLE HUNGER

This long-standing charitable event saw the Edmonton Elks take on the Montreal Alouettes. Though the Elks did not win, eager football fans donated 2,123 kilograms of food and \$27,780! The Food Bank was definitely the winner at this game.

HARVEST LUNCHEON

We welcomed the return the annual luncheon at our Annex in October to celebrate the harvest! With guests from across the city, we shared an intimate meal filled with laughter. Our guest speaker, Edmonton Elks President and CEO, Victor Cui, provided an intimate experience by sharing his story. With ticket sales, silent auction items, and in-person donations we raised \$43,220!

Additionally, our local City Market brought in over \$20,000 as an added bonus – funds are used to target purchase key staples.



BILLY TALENT

For their Crisis of Faith Tour, Billy Talent collected non-perishable food donations at each stop of the tour – guests donated 71 kg of food and volunteers enjoyed the show. In addition, the band donated a custom Billy Talent skateboard for us to use in our Magical Christmas Music Gala Silent Auction to raise more funds.

EDMONTON SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA

Edmonton Symphony Orchestra Giving Back! Thanks to the ongoing support of our local musicians and their generous patrons, an amazing gift of \$16,367 was raised during the December ESO concerts.



CRAM THE CRUISER

In collaboration with the Edmonton Police Service, Kingsway Superstore held a Cram the Cruiser event which brought in 446 kg of food donations!



GEEKY GIFT MARKET

This was the second year the market asking for donations from attendees. They raised over \$7,000 and 973 kilograms of food during their weekend market.

Thanks to the RBC Foundation, our festive campaign goals were met! Events, private donations, and community raised \$3.5 M and 300,000 kilograms of food.

CANDY CANE LANE

The annual light up invited people to come down and admire the festive light displays from cars, on walk-only nights, or on sleigh rides. Individuals could donate food items in the many Food Bank donation bins along the route, and enjoy a hot chocolate as well. Donations from Candy Cane Lane totalled 11,859 kg.



ETS STUFF A BUS

Partnering with another retail food donor, Save On Foods, this annual event collected \$25,732 and 20,201 kilograms of food. With the help of transit peace officers and ETS volunteers, shoppers banded together to cram the cruiser or stuff the bus between November 23-27.

Raising \$88,580, the evening was uplifting, with guests enjoying Tom Jackson's Stories, Songs, and Santa Causes, including his famous Huron Carole.


