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ABOUT THE PANTRY



Over the past five years, the demand for food assistance in Edmonton has increased dramatically. In 2020, Edmonton's Food Bank provided hampers to an average of 21,385 clients per month. By 2024, that number had risen to 41,697—a staggering reflection of the economic challenges facing households. This growing need has compelled us to continually adapt our programs to meet the immediate needs of the community while also addressing the deeper issues contributing to food insecurity.

While many of our clients seek food hampers on an asneeded limited basis, there is an increase in individuals who rely on our services more frequently. For these clients, we have sensitive and thoughtful conversations. These discussions allow us to better understand their circumstances and help them access additional resources. While food is an urgent and immediate need, we recognize that there are broader challenges our clients face.

To create space for these meaningful conversations, we ensure that we can have special time. During these scheduled sessions, our team takes the time to understand our clients' unique situations, identify options, and connect them with resources such as government programs, tax completion services,

discount food options, collective kitchens, and even our Beyond Food Program. The goal is to ensure no one goes hungry and empower individuals and families with the tools they need to reduce their reliance on food hampers and increase their food security.

Once the conversation is complete, clients can select food for themselves and their families in our Pantry, which operates like a small grocery store. This shopping model allows clients to make choices that best suit their needs.



We are committed to meeting the immediate need for food and addressing the underlying causes of hunger in our community. Our Pantry program is one step toward that goal, ensuring that every client feels supported and empowered on their journey towards food security.



MESSAGE FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR

As we reflect on the year gone by, it is with both a deep sense of pride and a sobering awareness of the ongoing challenges that we share this Annual Report with you. Over the past year, our community has faced increasing levels of need, with food insecurity continuing to be a concern for many. Together, we will continue to support those in need and work towards a community where food insecurity is no longer a daily concern.



PEOPLE SERVED


Our hamper programs account for roughly half of all our food support in Edmonton, with the other half delivered through our network of agency partners. Together, these hamper programs provided food to a cumulative total of 500,364 individuals last year which represents 79,632 different people.

Behind each number is a story. A friend. A colleague. A neighbour. A parent. An isolated senior. A growing child. A sibling. Every hamper represents not just a meal, but dignity, compassion, and connection in a moment of need.

Thanks to the unwavering dedication of our donors and volunteers, we continue to provide food hampers to thousands of people every month offering food, hope, and the reminder that they are not alone. Because of you, we are making change and helping each other.

In **2024**, Edmonton's Food Bank experienced **two all-time highs** for people accessing our hamper programs.



Both July (44,200 people) and October (47,058 people) were record breaking months in our 44-year history for people seeking food help.

EDMONTON FOOD DRIVE

More than 6,000 volunteers, led by members of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, came together to collect an astounding 125,132 kg of food. This annual food drive, covering approximately 200,000 homes, represents one of the largest and most coordinated community-led efforts in support of Edmonton's Food Bank.

Multiple events and member services by AMA help the community! In 2024, AMA partnered with Kingsway Mall to support Edmonton's Food Bank with rooftop bees and a container garden. Events like Helping the Harvest, Fill Our Fleet, and AMA Recycling raised 6,185 kg of food and \$100,741!











TASTE OF EDMONTON

Taste of Edmonton and Court Jester Dueling Pianos raised \$15,582 for Edmonton's Food Bank through donated food tickets and performance tips.



GRAHAM CONSTRUCTION

Shaun's resume was reviewed, and he was encouraged to do some volunteering to help bridge the gap in his work history while building confidence and connections. From there, he attended an interview skills workshop and completed additional training. With a renewed sense of hope and new forklift qualifications under his belt, he began applying for jobs. Not long after, Shaun had good news to share: he'd landed a full-time position. He was thrilled, relieved, and full of gratitude.

Our Beyond Food Program provides a range of services, including financial literacy, resume writing, safety tickets, and more. In 2024, the program supported 3,672 registered participants, with 40% securing employment.

BRITTANY'S STORY


Brittany, an Indigenous woman in her late 20s, came to our Beyond Food Program looking for guidance. After taking five years off to raise her child, she was ready to return to work but wasn't sure where to start.

With support from our team, Brittany attended resume and interview workshops, completed her Fall Protection training, and refreshed her skills through free online courses. We also connected her with Indigenous and women-focused organizations, where she could build new experience and grow her confidence through volunteering. All her hard work paid off. Brittany secured a great job and in a touching moment, returned to Beyond Food with a handwritten thank-you card for the team.

Because of you, neighbours like Brittany are supported beyond food toward new beginnings, meaningful work, and brighter futures. Thank you.



Seth and Deb, a young couple and new permanent residents in Canada, had both studied and practiced medicine in their home country. Their English was excellent, but like many newcomers, they didn't know where to begin in a new system. They turned to our Beyond Food Program for guidance, looking for survival jobs related to their previous experience so they could continue working toward full licensure in Canada. Together, they took part in our Canadian Workplace Culture, Resume Writing, and Interview Skills workshops, followed by soft skills training. They also




completed First Aid & Childcare First Aid, Basic Food Safety, and a series of online certifications. Each step was bringing them closer to their goals.

With this support, Seth and Deb both found jobs in the health sector and are steadily working on updating their credentials. They recently stopped by to thank Edmonton's Food Bank for helping them navigate the path toward a new future.

Because of you, newcomers like Seth and Deb contribute their skills in meaningful ways in their new home. Thank you.

QUINN'S STORY

Quinn is a 33-year old Food Bank client struggling with mobility issues from a worksite accident. After three months off work, and on a reduced income, he reached out to the Food Bank for help. "Everything was going great until my accident, and now the bills are the same but my income is far less", he said. We approved Quinn for home delivery for a period of six months to take some stress off him while he looked after his health.

Thank you so much for helping me. I know I'll be back to health soon enough and will give back to the Food Bank!

Through this experience, Quinn learned that asking for help is a sign of strength, and that together communities can lift one another in times of need.



Client Services has responded to as many as 349 calls, 125 emails, and 319 online hamper orders in a single day.

AMANDA'S STORY



A food hamper is a box of food, consisting of fresh and non-perishable food items. Hampers are assembled based on the size of the household and any dietary requirements*. Upon request, additional items may be added such as pet food, school snack items, and toiletries.

As a charity, Edmonton's Food Bank cannot provide all the nutritional and food needs for all people at all times. We rely on donated food and encourage people to make purchasing food a priority when they receive their paycheques, salary, or government financial support. Beyond hampers, we refer people to other helping organizations to help with housing, budgeting, and more support.

MOBILE FOOD DEPOTS



Where there are limited hamper distribution opportunities (i.e. no physical building to work from), hampers are delivered and distributed to specific communities using our Mobile Hamper truck.

FOOD DEPOTS



We want people to a get their food in their neighbourhood close to home. To do this, we collaborate with over 80 community food depots. Volunteers at these sites are instrumental for food access around Edmonton.

EMERGENCY BAGS



These bags of food are for specific service providers for distribution to individuals in crisis. The bags are prepared with non-perishable items, some key staples, along with information to access more food in the future. We work with the Edmonton Police Service and others to give these bags to high-risk individuals and families.



Our **Programs & Services**







Our work cannot be done in isolation. We work collaboratively with over 350 community partners and agencies to distribute over 450,000 meals and snacks per month. Food access for our partner agencies depends on the program requirements and the focus of their mission, and is provided free of charge.



S.N.A.C.K. PROGRAM

(SUPPORTING NUTRITION FOR ALL CLASSES AND KIDS)

We provide healthy snacks to children and we are currently working with 100 schools plus numerous child-focused programming throughout Edmonton. In addition to donated snacks from the public, the Food Bank purchases key items to ensure availability and nutrition. These purchased snacks have no added sugar, low sodium, and include items like granola bars, unsweetened apple sauce, shelf stable milk, and more.

AFTER THE BELL

Thanks to Food Banks Canada and amazing donors, we share healthy food packs through various agencies directly to children.

After the Bell reduces child hunger by providing a lifeline over the summer for many low-income families with children. These child-friendly, nutritious packs contain non-perishable food along with a variety of fresh fruit and vegetables like carrots, apples, oranges, and snap peas depending on the weeks' fresh purchases.

After the Bell is possible thanks to dedicated national donors who support the program across the country.





Food Sources





Edmonton's Food Bank started as a food gleaning organization in 1981. This salvaged and rescued food is the basis of our food sources and makes up about two-thirds of the food we give out to people. We collect surplus food from retailers, distributors, and food industry partners across the city. This salvaged food may be considered surplus based on a number of factors including seasonal changes, overstock, or damaged exterior packaging.

We are proud to partner with our local grocery stores, retail food providers, local producers, and distributors who contribute surplus food to help our work. Additionally, our local gardeners, producers and distributors contribute surplus food to help our work.





About 60% of food is rescued/salvaged




Each year, Edmonton's Food Bank rescues or recovers millions of kilograms of food from the food industry. This food includes fresh vegetables and fruit, baked goods, dairy, non-perishables, and frozen meats. Rescued food is used in our hamper programs for individuals and families and is available to our agency partners.

Edmonton's Food Bank adheres to the food safety guidelines of Alberta Health Services when collecting and distributing food. Our trucks are refrigerated to keep food at the proper temperature during transport - very important on hot summer days! Once at the Food Bank food is placed into industrial coolers and freezers until it is needed.

PLANT, GROW, SHARE A ROW

This program encourages people to earmark and donate their homegrown fruit and vegetables to Edmonton's Food Bank. Some businesses such as Greenland Garden Centre and the Royal Mayfair Golf Club took this philosophy a step further by donating free seedlings to be grown and donated to Edmonton's Food Bank. Other amazing donors like the Little Potato Company provided seed potatoes to many gardens.

Unfortunately, due to space limitations we are unable to list all our "green-thumb" donors who collectively raise annually more than 40,000 kilograms of fresh produce for our programs.





SECOND HELPING

In cooperation with conference centres and large banquet facilities, Second Helping gleans prepared yet not plated food from major kitchens. Donations are frozen, picked up, and made available to agency partners for use in their meal and snack programs. Donors adhere to Alberta Health Services protocols for food safety and packaging needs. The Edmonton Convention Centre and others are part of this program.






Edmonton's Food Bank is an approved teaching facility for Concordia University's Environmental Health Program to show future health inspectors proper food warehouse management.

BEYOND FOOD


